FOREWARD

Astoria Nordic Heritage Park was a heritage project of the Astoria Scandinavian Heritage Association that took seven years of planning and cost \$1.5 million to build. The park project aligns with the Astoria Scandinavian Heritage Association's mission "to preserve traditional Scandinavian culture and heritage through educational opportunities in areas of customs, language, food and the arts and to educate the citizens of Clatsop County and surrounding areas about the culture and heritage of the Scandinavian countries" by developing interpretive materials for groups that visit the park. This phase of the project addresses 3rd to 5th graders in Clatsop County. Teachers at Lewis and Clark Elementary in the Astoria School District specifically requested more information about Astoria Nordic Heritage Park to incorporate into their annual Walking Tour of Astoria fieldtrips. These materials are free online for all to download for in person and virtual fieldtrips to the park.

WHO WE ARE

Astoria Scandinavian Heritage Association (ASHA) is a cultural non-profit with a mission to preserve traditional Nordic culture and heritage and to educate citizens and visitors about the culture and heritage of the Nordic countries. Its primary objective is to renew and celebrate Nordic heritage every June with a three-day festival of all things Scandinavian.

BACKGROUND

The State of Oregon was home to only about 47 Scandinavians in 1870 but by the turn of the century they were coming to the Pacific Northwest in droves. Many came to the local area after 1870 when the railroad was completed from San Francisco to Astoria. Most of the large number of immigrants who settled in Astoria were loggers, fishermen, farmers, and small business owners. In 1900, the largest number of foreign born Astorians were from Finland, then Sweden, Norway, Germany, England, and Denmark. By the 1910 census there were 9599 inhabitants in Astoria and 35% of the population identified as Nordic. Although blood lines are intermingled now, Astoria is still proud of its Nordic roots and the contributions of early immigrants to the community.

Rationale for Astoria Nordic Heritage Park

In addition to sponsoring an annual three-day Midsummer Festival, the Nordic community wanted to preserve and promote its heritage with a year-round accessible monument. Planning for Astoria Nordic Heritage Park began in 2015. After seven years of fundraising and with much community involvement, construction began in the fall of 2021 and was completed in June 2022 in time for a festive dedication just before the Midsummer Festival. Astoria Nordic Heritage Park is a testimony to the strong pride that still exists in Astoria's Nordic community and beyond.

Why are there trolls in the Nordic Park?

Trolls are part of Nordic myths and folklore. Other words for trolls are gnomes, elves, and nisse, tomte, or tonttu in the Nordic languages. Some trolls are dwarves and some are giants. The small kind live in Astoria Nordic Heritage Park. Trolls can be mischievous and baffling to humans who they sometimes try to trick or deceive. Some trolls are helpful to animals and some may be only visible to children. Each troll in Astoria Nordic Heritage Park has its own story and they are collected in a booklet called **Astoria Nordic Heritage Park Troll Tales.**

Storyline

Astoria Nordic Heritage Park Aerial View (below left)

Astoria Nordic Heritage Park is located between Marine Drive and the Astoria RiverWalk across from the east entrance to Historic Downtown Astoria at 16th Street. Astoria Nordic Heritage Park is an enhancement to the site formerly known as Peoples Park and is owned by the City of Astoria.





Riverwalk Grand Entrance (above right)

The staircase and accessible walkway from the Astoria RiverWalk to Nordic Heritage Park represent the immigrants' farewell to the Nordic lands ("We Said Our Last Goodbyes"). The flags as viewed from the RiverWalk fly according to international protocol.

Astoria Nordic Heritage Park from Marine Drive (below left)

Five granite pillars represent Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden. Six flag poles fly flags of the Nordic countries and the U.S. on special occasions. Steamer trunks on the plaza reflect the meager prize possessions that Nordic immigrants brought with them to a new country.





Arrival Plaza with Midsummer Pole (above right)

The Midsummer Pole is the main feature of the Arrival Plaza. It represents the traditions that the Nordic immigrants brought with them to the new land. Five metal bands set in the concrete reflect the five Nordic groups that came together to create the Nordic community in Astoria.

Gateway Arch (below left)

"We Came to Work" is the theme of the path proceeding from the Arrival Plaza through the Gateway Arch. Nordic immigrants came to contribute and find their version of the American dream.





Reflective Path (above right)

Interpretive panels explain the significance of contributions of Nordic immigrants to the fabric of our local community. Artistic representations on the granite slabs honor typical early immigrant professions such as fishermen, logger, cannery worker, carpenter, dairy worker, and domestic worker. Benches at the end of the path let park visitors enjoy the view and reflect on the Nordic immigrant experience on the North Coast.

PRE-VISIT ACTIVITIES



Park Etiquette & FAQs

- Please be mindful of the trolley tracks when near the River Walk. Look both ways as you cross them as there might be a trolley coming in your direction!
- Please walk at all times in the park. This is especially important because Marine Drive is also a highway (hwy 30), which is busy with cars and trucks at all times of the year.
- If you are lucky enough to get sunshine on the day of your visit, it is still a good idea to dress in layers. The wind can be cold and brisk off the Columbia River and the weather can change quickly.
- There is one restroom at the park that is free and open to the public.
- The Nordic Heritage Park is under the jurisdiction of Astoria Parks and Recreation. Please take the time to read the park rules signage which includes guidelines for general city park etiquette.

Can I approach the trolls?

Yes! We encourage people to get as close to the trolls as they feel comfortable. The area around Margit and Olle is surrounded by bark chips and is intended to be walked on/in. You may even touch a troll if you are feeling brave, but we ask that you keep your feet on the ground. The trolls are not for climbing or sitting on.

Where should I park?

There are some designated parking spots just east of Mo's Restaurant along the River Walk. If you are arriving by bus, the Columbia River Maritime Museum might be the best drop-off place. Their parking lot is very large and easy for school buses to maneuver.

Is there anything else to do nearby?

Yes! If you are visiting Astoria for educational purposes, in additional to the Nordic Heritage Park, we highly recommend the Columbia River Maritime Museum, The Cannery Musuem at Pier 39, the Heritage Museum, Uppertown Firefighters Museum, the Flavel House, and the Oregon Film Museum. You can visit astoriamuseums.org for more information.

Remember that the recommended entrance to the park is from the Grand Entrance on the River Walk, not Marine Drive or the Parking Lot.

Accordion – popular folk instrument in Nordic lands

Folk Dancers – people who dance the waltz and polka

Hardanger embroidery – a specialized cross stitch found in Norway

Hardanger fiddle – a fiddle found in Norway with more strings than a violin

Julbock - a Christmas goat made of straw

Lucia Crown -worn by the young woman of the family on a December holiday in Sweden

Nordic knitting pattern – a design that appears on Nordic mittens, caps, and sweaters

Reindeer – an animal typical in the far north

Royal Symbol – found in many Nordic lands because many Nordic countries have kings and queens

Sauna Bucket & dipper – tools for spending time in a small heated room in Finland

Snowdrops – flowers that bloom in early spring in the Nordic lands

Stavkirke – wooden Gothic church built without nails

Stabbur (storehouse) – raised storehouse to keep grain off ground

Sølje – Norwegian jewelry worn to demonstrate wealth

Viking helmet – worn by the Vikings to protect their head and face in battle


Viking ship – used by Viking explorers to roam the world



What are Trolls? Background Information for Classroom Teachers

Nordic fairytales and fables contain many types of mythical, human-like creatures called trolls. As in most folklore, these trolls are used to explain or teach something about the world including the shape and height of the mountains, waterways, and forests. While these troll characters are often sinister and dark, they can also be viewed as playful tricksters with mischievous personalities.

One of the most famous Nordic folktales is The Three Billy Goats Gruff in which three goats must outsmart a hungry troll to get over a bridge that leads to their feeding ground. It was written by Peter Christen Asbjørnsen and Jørgen Moe from Norway who were considered comparable to the German born Brothers Grimm.

In a similar spirit, The Nordic Heritage Park chose to depict trolls in a family-friendly fashion, complete with unique personalities and backgrounds. For the purposes of education, it is important to recognize that trolls are widespread in Nordic folklore and culture.

Troll Tales Synopsis

The six trolls in the Nordic Park are assumed to be immigrants.

Viktor brought his grandfather's pipe to remind him of his grandfather.

Margit needed new friends in a new country so she found Fat Cat.

Olle (pronounced Oh-luh) could only bring one toy but sometimes visitors to the park bring him new ones.

Sven brought his accordion and remembers the old tunes so people in Astoria can dance them too.


Leif (pronounced layf) is very shy because he grew up in a cave so he hides under a leaf.

Annette (pronounced Annettah) is outgoing and likes to sing with the sea lions. Come at night and maybe you'll hear her.

Denmark Features a white Nordic cross on a red background. The white is said to represent peace while the red is said to represent battles. The flag was adopted in 1625.	
Norway Features a navy-blue Nordic cross outlined in white on a red background. The combination of colors represents Norway's freedom. The flag was designed in 1821.	
Sweden Features a golden yellow Nordic cross on a field of light blue. Blue and yellow are traditional Swedish colors. Golden yellow is said to stand for generosity while the light blue represents justice and truth. The flag was adopted in 1906.	
Iceland Features a bright red Nordic cross in a larger white cross on a background of sky blue. The colors represent the country's land. The bright red stands for the volcanoes, white for the snow, and blue for the mountains on the island. IT was adopted in 1944.	
Finland Features a blue Nordic cross on a bright white background. It is said that white stands for snow while blue is for bodies of water and the sky. Finland adopted the flag in 1918.	

A Nordic cross is a cross shape that looks to be on its side when the flag is on a flagpole. These countries were started with a Christian religious background, so the crosses represent that history as well.
